Nazi policy systematically isolated and ostracized Germany's 535,000 Jews, barring them from schools, professions, and the military, crippling them economically, and cutting them from the social and cultural fabric of the country. In 1935, the Nuremberg Laws declared German Jews non-citizens and stripped them of their civil rights.

BERNKASTEL-KUES, Rhineland Germany — A small Jewish Community inhabited Bern-Kastel from the late 13th century.

In 1925, the community was united with neighboring Kues. bringing the Jewish population to 59 by 1933.


By 1938 15 Jews and three Jewish businesses remained.

On Kristalinacht (November 9 & 10, 1938) the synagogue was wrecked. In all, 32 Jews emigrated from Germany, including 20 to the United States.

From 1937 to 1940, 15 Jews moved to other places in Germany.

The last four Jews were deported to Lodz on October 16, 1940.
